May Staff Letter

How do you belong to church?

The Bishop of Manchester, The Right Reverend David Walker has been undertaking a study of church going and what has emerged are four dimensions of belonging to church. So which are you?

Activities: these people belong through being 'active' in the church, attending services regularly, perhaps being on church committees, going along to study groups, being part of a planned giving scheme. These people are often the back bone of the local church.

Events: these people are much more comfortable with one-off occasions, seasonal services, Christmas, Easter, Harvest, social occasions, church fairs, raising money to support the church. In these events, David Walker's research suggests that they are genuinely seeking spiritual refreshment and closeness to God.

People: these identify themselves with those who are regular attenders though they themselves may not be, but being in company with those who do frequent church draws them closer to God. There are many we may know in our church congregations who cause you to feel closer to God when you're with them.

Places: these people belong through the significance of the church building or specific places that hold a memory. Maybe where they were married there or Christened there. Particular locations are said to heighten our awareness of God.

Clergy often have people apologising to them for not going to church regularly and who feel terribly guilty about it. We have to reassure them that that's OK, that God is for us not against us. From what Bishop David writes it's perhaps easier to understand that there are many levels of being part of church, of being part of a body of people and God loves everyone equally. Qualification for His love is not equal with Sundays attended, fetes organised or people associated with, God is in all dimensions of belonging and because of Jesus always there when we turn to him.

From the Rector

Lent Course - Financial Administrator - Deanery Synod - Annual Meeting

Lent Course – This year's Lent Course looked at the early churches and their behaviour. The course started in Worle Community Centre and then visited each of the four churches. Everyone seemed to enjoy the simplicity of reading the letters from the Bible and clergy particularly enjoyed the preparation of maps, photos and notes relating to the apostle Paul's missionary journeys. The staff team is asking for feedback and there are evaluation forms in each of the churches.

Financial Administrator and Fees Administration – A grant for a part-time Financial Administrator, is to be awarded by the Diocesan Fund for Church Growth on a phased basis over three years. The Diocese also sent an assessor on 10 April to better understand the finance system at Worle. The Sub-Group will meet shortly to finalise the grant details and begin the recruitment process.

Deanery Synod Representatives – Members from the Parish will have been elected to the new Deanery Synod, which starts in June. This will be a crucial new three year term for the Deanery as it moves to implement its Mission Action Plan. Please find out who the Representative is for your church and ask them to keep you up to date with progress.

Annual Parochial Church Meeting – At the time of writing, there is much preparation going into this annual meeting. It will have been a time to look back and celebrate progress and services throughout 2013.

United Pentecost Service – once a year, a united service is held for all four churches and main morning worship is held at St Mark's Church. This year the service will be held on Sunday 8 June at 10.30am. Please put this date in your diary and celebrate Pentecost together with all four churches.

Rogation Sunday 25 May, Cream Teas and Teddy Bears - Rogation was formerly a time to give thanks to God for the land and to walk the parish boundaries. In our church service at 6pm we pray for God's blessing on all who live and work in Wick St Lawrence village and estate and beyond. Before this we offer cream teas from 2.30pm – 5pm in Wick St Lawrence Village Hall and this year we will also be having our popular Teddy Parachute Jump off the church tower from 4pm. Here we are in the middle of spring....

The South West is a place blessed with sunshine and a moderate climate (well, some of the time at least!). Being originally from Salford I very much appreciate the warmer temperatures and the extra hours of sunshine here in Worle!

I thought it would be good to reflect for a moment on some different meanings of the word 'spring'.....

SPRINGTIME

We are in a fresh green country which is being renewed by new life bursting out everywhere. There are still some familiar landmarks but even they look fresher. There is colour, sound and bright light.

But spring also shows up the dust and dirt and we find we have to do some spring cleaning in ourselves so that the light can get to our darkest corners and make us more whole, refreshed and new.

COILED SPRING

This kind of spring is resilient. It returns to its original shape whenever it is pulled, or contracted. In us, this spring might be thought of as the power of God. So we can be stretched by overwork, the cares of our daily lives, responding to an emergency and God restores us to our original shape. Or, we can be sat upon, diminished in some way, and He brings us back to the shape in which He made us, and in which He wants and loves us.

SPRING OF WATER

This spring bursts out of the rocks, or from the ground beneath us and flows through the land freshening and re-vitalising as it goes. Even its sound is refreshing when we are hot and dry. It provides water to drink and to wash in. So we come to think of Jesus at the well in Samaria and his promise to give that woman, and us, 'living water'.

'Whoever drinks the water I give him will never thirst. Indeed, the water I give him will become in him a spring of water welling up to eternal life.' (John 4:14 NIV).

Messy Church was held on Saturday 5 April. The topic was Christ's Passion and our crafts covered from Palm Sunday to Christ's Resurrection.


The children decorated shortbread biscuits, learnt how to do Iris
